CALL THE MEETING TO ORDER

Council President Bromberg called the meeting to order at 8:00 pm in the Council Chambers located at 406 Rivervale Road, River Vale, New Jersey 07675.

SALUTE TO FLAG

Council President Bromberg asked all in attendance to rise and join him in a Salute to the Flag.

SUNSHINE LAW STATEMENT

Council President Bromberg read the Sunshine Statement into the record, as follows:

"In accordance with the provisions set forth in the Open Public Meetings Law, notification of this meeting has been sent to all officially appointed Township newspapers and notice is posted at the Municipal Office."

ROLL CALL

Councilman Ben-Yishay, Councilman Criscuolo, Councilwoman Sieg and Council President Bromberg were present. Councilman Donovan was absent.

Also present: Business Administrator/CFO Gennaro Rotella, Township Attorney Silvana Raso, Township Engineer, Christopher Statile, Township Clerk Karen Campanelli, Township Planner, Jeff Janota and Eric Gunderson, Superintendent of the Pascack Valley Regional High School District.

Council Comments

There were no Council comments this evening.

Business Administrator's Report

Mr. Rotella was very proud to present the 2016 Audit Report; adding that this by far is the best Audit the Township has ever received. Mr. Rotella made special mention that it is the employees at Town Hall, the DPW, Police and Court that give the Township a clean audit.

Township Engineer's Report

Mr. Statile reported that since the last meeting Edgewood Country Club filed a soil moving permit and flatted the soil down in the area where they formerly had piles. They will next be mulching and seeding the area. He next reported that will be awarding the 2017 Road Program this evening to D&L Paving. Mr. Statile further reported that they will be paving 2 ½ miles of roadway. He explained that hopefully the Township receives funding for Poplar Road which would then free up an additional \$150,000 to pave more roads. Included in this year's Road Program is the minor repair of three culverts.

Mr. Statile next reported that they are preparing the grant application for the miniature golf course at the Country Club to be submitted to the County under the Open Space program; the due date is June 30th. Mr. Statile also expects to hear of the NJDOT Grant Award for Poplar Road sometime in June.

Special Presentation – Erik Gunderson, Superintendent PVRHS District

Mr. Gunderson thanked the Council for allowing him to attend this evenings meeting. He briefly explained the reason for his visit is to provide the Mayor and Council with some highlights of what's taking place in the District and answer any questions. Mr. Gunderson first recognized the two new members of the BOE from

River Vale; Joe Blundo and Jim Stankus who replaced longtime member Maura Ellis. Mr. Gunderson was happy to report that 50% of their graduating seniors have taken AP courses and they also offer a variety of classes where students can earn college credits. He further explained the growing area of dual enrollment courses; and that the high school is incorporating college level courses, taught by their teachers as adjunct professors with certain universities. He reported on the partnerships the high school has with Syracuse, Rutgers, Fairleigh Dickenson and the University of Texas. Mr. Gunderson added that more and more of their students will be graduating with college level credits.

Mr. Gunderson reported that the District is going to be implementing an 18 to 21 year old program. He explained that this year the district has a large enough population of students that they need to and are obligated to educate up to the age of 21. Mr. Gunderson further explained that up until recently these students have been sent to school out of district. He added that they have rented a building in the center of Hillsdale for the students to attend school. They will be attending school to learn daily living experiences within a simulated apartment and this will also give the students the needed exposure to the future work they will be doing after they graduate. Mr. Gunderson noted that this concept makes sense both financially and educationally allowing the students to attend school closer to home.

He next reported that their Internship Program continues to thrive with 100 student participating in the Senior Year Internship Program. He briefly explained that students in this program spend the second half of their day throughout the entire school year in a place of work that they are interested in and possibly pursuing in the future. This program continues to expand and is now partnered with both the Emerson and Park Ridge school districts.

Mr. Gunderson announced that their Wellness Center had a successful first year. This program has a student/family liaison counsellor whose primary function is to work with students who are dealing with mental illness and emotional issues. The program also helps their family to connect with outside resources and various support groups.

Mr. Gunderson next announced that the District has adopted a videotaping policy for their Board of Education meetings; all meeting are posting on the BOE website. He also announced that this year the Robotics Team was deemed World Champions at a completion held in St. Louis. Mr. Gunderson also reviewed the Student Exchange Program and that currently they have students in Italy, Spain and Taiwan.

Mr. Gunderson concluded with updates on various constructions projects; including improvements to the HVAC system in the Science wing at PVHS and much needed renovations to the PHS Field Complex. Next summer there are plans to renovate the Music wing at Pascack Valley and to replace the turf field at Pascack Valley which was originally installed in 2006.

Councilman Ben-Yishay commended Mr. Gunderson on the incredible work the high school is doing. He also had questions regarding the 18 to 21 program and who is the target audience. Mr. Gunderson responded that dependent upon the student's learning disability they are eligible to continue receiving services until the age of 21.

Councilwoman Sieg questioned how many young ladies are interested in the Engineering studies. Mr. Gunderson responded that almost 50% of the members of the Robotic Team are female.

Councilman Criscuolo also commended Mr. Gunderson and noted that his son is graduating from PV this year and he is leaving with 7 college credits. Councilman Criscuolo commented on how beneficial this was from a number of aspects. He explained that his son was able to have a college level experience, the cost was very reasonable and his son also benefited when registering for classes for college because it was based on the number of college credits you had. He added that his son was able to register earlier than the other freshmen.

Council President Bromberg thanked Mr. Gunderson for attending this evening meeting and appreciates the updates.

1st Hearing of the Public

Motion by Councilwoman Sieg; second by Councilman Criscuolo to open the meeting to the public.

Richard Tax—630 Montview Place— Mr. Tax commented that he has been a River Vale resident since 1952. He questioned the status of the deer meeting and is there a report available.

Council President Bromberg responded that there is no official report yet however they did make comments during the last Work Session meeting. He reported that representatives from the Department of Fish, Game & Wildlife explained and educated them about the deer and noted the decimation of foliage in River Vale due to the deer herd. Council President Bromberg commented that he is not sure what the ultimate solution is

however a number of options were deemed not useful such as sterilization programs due to the high cost. He further reported that they are currently trying to work with other Towns to come up with a solution. Council President Bromberg further reported that the Mayor is arranging to have the experts from the State come back and speak at a public forum.

Mr. Tax questioned whether a committee had been formed. Councilwoman Sieg responded they have not yet formed the committee but when they do he will be notified. She commented that they learned a lot from the meeting with the State and now they need the support of the other Towns. Councilwoman Sieg added that they definitely want the residents educated through an open forum with the State.

Thomas Slattery—575 Forest Drive—Mr. Slattery questioned why are no meeting minutes posted since the end of March; the Township Clerk will check and have website updated. Mr. Slattery also questioned whether Edgewood Country Club applied for a Tree Removal permit. Council President Bromberg responded that for a certain amount of trees you would need a permit with respect to the percentage of property. Mr. Statile responded that their property is very large and there is a threshold; he added that he did not have any knowledge of any trees being taken down.

Robert Relay—211 Patriot Lane—Mr. Relay commented that whatever is being done at Edgewood should be good for the community and not unhealthful. He also does not want the site to have an inordinate amount of mosquitoes and a terrible smell as it has in the past. Mr. Relay also commented that the Mayor and or Council have been in touch with the Bergen County Health & Environmental Services Department who he believes gave the ok to move soil from the Soil Department. He also spoke to someone from the County who was concerned about solid waste; this person has contacted the NJDEP who have been also been at the site. Mr. Relay does not have an answer from the State at this time but the whole idea is for them to be proactive.

Mr. Relay added that they are concerns about their health and safety and that the investigation at this point is ongoing. He also feels the seeding of the area should be put on hold until the results are available.

Ed Bella—202 Patriot—questioned what the area of the golf course in question is called; he also would like his neighbor across the street to keep their property neat and clean as the rest of the neighborhood does. Mr. Bella would like the grass cut and the tracks from the tractor cleaned up; he would like someone from the Town to look at the site and they are still dumping in the area.

Mr. Statile added that the property on the golf course is considered woodland.

There being no further questions or comments from the public motion by Councilman Criscuolo; second by Councilwoman Sieg to close the meeting to the public.

ORDINANCE #325-2017

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF RIVER VALE, COUNTY OF BERGEN NEW JERSEY TO AMEND CHAPTER 21 OF THE TOWNSHIP CODE ENTITLED, "HEALTH, BOARD OF," TO SET THE MINIMUM NUMBER OF BOARD OF HEALTH MEMBERS AND ALTER THE INITIAL TERMS OF APPOINTMENT OF MEMBERS TO THE BOARD OF HEALTH

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 26-3-3 provides that a Municipality’s Board of Health shall be composed of not less than five nor more than seven members; and

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 26:3-6 provides that the terms of not more than three members of a Municipality’s Board of Health shall expire in any one year;

BE IT ORDAINED by the Township Council of the Township of River Vale that § 21-2(A) is amended as follows:

- A. Within the Division of Health Services, there shall be an Advisory Health Board, which shall be composed of no less than five and no more than seven members appointed by the Mayor. The members shall serve for staggered terms of four years from the date of their appointment, except that, at the time of their appointment, two shall be appointed for a term of one year, two for a term of two years, two for a term of three years and one for a term of four years. All members shall serve without compensation.

This Ordinance shall take effect following adoption and approval in a time and manner prescribed by law.

ROLL CALL VOTE

Councilman Ben-Yishay, Councilman Criscuolo, Councilwoman Sieg and Council President Bromberg voted yes. Councilman Donovan was absent.
